What is History?

History is more than simply fact-gathering and memorization. Like all of the liberal arts, historical study is a process of discovery, analysis, and communications.

Studying history prepares students to engage the world through their civic participation, professional life, and personal relationships.

History students explore the past by conducting research in original sources and published scholarship. They analyze evidence discovered in documents, maps, numbers, photographs, artifacts, music, and digital sources. They construct arguments, propose new interpretations, and express conclusions.

Career Opportunities

History majors make good candidates for a wide range of jobs because of the skills developed through rigorous coursework. The study of history requires the ability to investigate, analyze and communicate complex interrelationships, and the curiosity to seek out answers from multiple sources. These same skills are key to becoming a successful leader and decision-maker in business, government, law, journalism, marketing, education, research and politics.

History majors graduate with skills that can be applied to a variety of careers.

- Excellent verbal and written communication
- The ability to think critically
- Creative problem-solving and decision-making skills
- Ability to work in a team

93% of employers say these skills matter most when they are hiring new employees! (Survey done by the National Association of Colleges and Employers.)

There is no “typical” job for a history major. Our graduates can be found in all types of companies and in all types of roles.

Currently, you’ll find our alumni at places like Milwaukee Public Schools, Northwestern Mutual, Aurora Healthcare, numerous historical societies and museums, big and small law firms, American Girl, Kohl’s, the City of Milwaukee and countless other private and public sector organizations.

Requirements for the Major

The history major requires 36 credits with a 2.5 GPA in all courses in the major distributed as follows:

at least 6 credits in European history	
at least 6 credits in U.S. history	
at least 9 credits in non-Western or global history	
at least 3 credits in a course dealing with the period before 1500	
at least 18 credits in courses numbered 300 and above (at least 15 of which must be taken at UWM)	
Hist 600 – Seminar in History: (Subtitle) (History majors with a GPA of 3.33 or higher in all history credits attempted may, with the consent of the faculty thesis advisor and the department chair, take Hist 681-682, a two-semester senior thesis project, in lieu of Hist 600)

History Minor

The history minor is comprised of 18 credits:

at least 3 credits in European history
at least 3 credits in U.S. history
at least 3 credits in non-Western or global history
at least 9 credits in courses numbered 300 or above

History minors must maintain a 2.5 GPA in all history credits.

Online Major and Minor

The requirements for the major and minor in History can be completed online. Combined with the “First Sixty Credits” program, which provides online courses necessary to complete the University’s General Education Requirements, a student opting for the online history major may be able to earn the degree entirely online.



The only degree requirement not available online is foreign language. For students who still need foreign language, they can work with their advisor to explore alternative ways to obtain those credits. Most often, students either come to UWM for those classes if they are located in the Milwaukee area, or they take the courses at a college near them and then transfer the credits back to UWM.

Research Opportunities

The History Department is an active partner with UWM’s Office of Undergraduate Research. Undergraduates have the opportunity to enhance their education by completing a focused research experience, similar to the type of work that graduate students engage in. Students participating in the program work closely with one or more faculty members to conduct research, read and analyze primary and secondary sources, choose a topic, formulate a thesis, develop an argument, cite sources and produce final documentation.

Current Faculty Research

Current UWM faculty members are conducting research on a wide variety of topics, peoples, countries, and time periods. Some examples are:

Related Certificates

The College offers more than 20 certificate programs that can be completed with an undergraduate degree or as stand-alone programs. Certificates require 18 to 21 credits in a focused subject area. They are similar to a minor but include coursework from a variety of disciplines. Of particular interest to students of history are the certificates in:

At many large universities, research opportunities for undergraduate students are limited. At UWM, you can gain hands-on experience working side-by-side with faculty, and many students graduate with multiple experiences to list on their resumé.



This sample four-year plan shows just one possible pathway to earning a degree with this major in four years. This plan **does not** replace the advice of your advisor, and students are cautioned to meet regularly with their advisor to create a personalized plan that matches their particular circumstances. This plan also follows the degree requirements for students who began their college education in Fall of 2013 or later. If you started college prior to Fall of 2013, your degree requirements may be different.

Degree Requirements (brief summary):

1. English Proficiency and UWM Oral and Written Communication (OWC) GER - English 102 (fulfills Part A) and one OWC-Part B course.
2. Math Proficiency, UWM Quantitative Literacy (QL) GER, and Formal Reasoning – two courses can satisfy all three requirements. Some courses have prerequisites, however, so a student may end up taking more than two total classes depending on his/her placement test scores. Students will usually take Math 103, 105, or 108 AND three credits in either a 200-level or above math course, Philosophy 211, or an approved Letters & Science statistics course.
3. Foreign Language – 4 semesters of a single Foreign Language (or 3 semesters of one language and 2 semesters of another language) (May be satisfied through 4 years of a single Foreign Language in high school.)
4. L&S Humanities – 12 credits
5. L&S Social Sciences – 12 credits
6. L&S Natural Science – 12 credits including one laboratory
7. L&S International – 9 credits usually accomplished in conjunction with Humanities and/or Social Science courses
8. UWM Arts GER – 3 credits
9. UWM Cultural Diversity GER – 3 credits usually accomplished in conjunction with a Humanities or Social Science course
10. 120 credits including 90 credits in L&S and with 36 of the 90 credits in L&S upper-level (numbered above 300) courses
11. Complete the History major requirements
 - 36 credits with at least 18 at the 300-level or above with 15 completed at UWM
 - One of Hist 288, 293, 294, 594, 595, or 596
