Daniel M. Soref Learning Commons Overview & Resource Tour – Molly Mathias

- Learning Commons
 - Opened in Fall 2009 (first floor west wing of the library)
 - Engaging space (you will hear students talking and meeting in groups unlike the quietness of a library)
 - High touch area – lots of study space and furniture can be moved around to fit students study needs
 - Access to technology (computer in the space and Wi-Fi)
 - Support and Assistance available
 - Grind Coffee Shop for refreshments
 - Library research staff help
 - UITS 24/5 Technology support
 - Campus Connections Space
 - For other partners to come in and meet with students in the Learning Commons
 - Examples: FYC, PASS, WRC, LGBT, CDC, CVSL, COAST
- Students in Learning Commons
 - Students have a “sense of place” here but it also has an academic vibe (students see other students studying so there is that sense of peer pressure that they should also be studying too)
 - Environment in the LC is impactful
 - Technology rich
 - Other students studying and working in groups (inclusion)
 - Students can work alone or with others
 - Always available as a resource
 - Communication with other students (use of questions on whiteboards around LC)
 - Questions posted like: What are your academic goals? What kind of jobs are you applying for? And students can write up responses on the whiteboards

- Campus Connections Best Practices (for other partners/offices utilizing the space)
 - Have appointments with students (rather than just having someone there from a certain time each week)
 - Promotion/awareness of events in the lobby – using candy or giveaways
 - Hold regular hours
 - Use of LCD monitor in the foyer in the LC (you also get other advertising privileges in the space)
