 - No chemistry of EPT-NNSE
 - Paper-based, no cost
 - Processed in PAWS in 2-3 weeks
 - Computer Based Testing
 - Open to students from any UW school, offered around the country and internationally
 - No chemistry or EPT-NNSE
 - \$80-100 in the USA, \$175 internationally
 - Processed in PAWS in 2-3 weeks


- Panther Math Prep (PMP)
 - Math department received a grant for 400 ALEKS PPL licenses for use with PMP
 - 100% online assessment and preparation for math retesting, recommended 20 hours minimum
 - Any matriculated incoming freshman is eligible to register for free; first come, first served
 - Letters will be mailed to all matriculated NF with 0 or 10 level placement; emails will be sent to personal email of all matriculated NF
 - Retesting available via the UW system placement test or with the math department via ALEKS
- No changes to cuts for English, FL, chemistry
 - o Students can now co-req Math 105 or 108 with Chem 100
- Retesting
 - Math or English one retest
 - 25 days since the first test was taken
 - The student has not had coursework in the subject area for the last two years, including transfer credit. This includes any coursework past the add/drop period
 - Foreign Language Placement Test (French/German/Spanish)
 - It has been 16 weeks since the first time the exam was taken
 - English Placement Test for Non-Native Speakers (EPT-NNSE) one retest
 - It has been 16 weeks since the first time they took the exam
 - Chemistry one retest
 - 8 weeks since the first test was taken

Ed Psych 101: Mary Walz-Chojnacki & Jackie Nguyen

- 101-104 course sequence
 - 101 is a variable topics class
 - Developed to serve students who were on academic probation or AOP
 - Then developed into a careers exploration course and primarily served AOP
 - Now been taken over by CPARC and moved to 110
 - 104 changed from 100 originally
- Ed Psych 101
 - Course was suspended, last time it was taught was around Spring 2016
 - Trying to find ways to support students after their first semester

- New vision for Ed Psych 101 for Spring 2019
 - Flip course design
 - Instructional content partially delivered out of class (online) with in-class time designated to working on coursework for other enrolled courses; in-class peer and instructional support on applying academic strategies
 - Numerous sections offered
 - Approximately 36 sections will be available across the week
 - Working to have small enrollment in each section
 - Students will enrolled in one 50-minute section (1 cr); out of class hours are devoted to applications of success strategies
 - Mid-semester recovery options
 - Students who learn they are on probation late in the previous semester or who determine they need additional support may join the course mid-semester (week 7-14), taking 2 classes per week

- Validate function on schedule planner

Online MBA Program: Matt Jensen

- Recent approval for 100% online MBA available starting in Fall 2018
- Approval for a course fee in lieu of tuition
 - One fee for all students if they are completely online students
 - \$2,550 per course
- Students need to notify after admission to receive course fee in lieu of tuition

- Students must be 100% online to get the course fee instead of tuition
- Students do not need a business background to do the MBA program
- Two foundation courses
 - Business mathematics
 - Financial accounting
- Currently one concentration fully online Business Analytics
 - Can also do a general MBA with online electives
