

Fostering Success at UWM: Tawney Latona

- History of foster youth support programs
 - The first comprehensive campus support program for foster youth started 20 years ago in California State University at Fullerton.
 - Western Michigan's program, which is 10 years old, was inspired by a statewide summit
 on foster youth attended by the college's directors of admissions and financial aid and a
 professor of social work.
 - o In 2014, UW-Stout began their Fostering Success program
- How it began at UWM
 - o Fall 2017
 - UW System single point of contact for foster youth (Tawney)
 - WASFAA/WACRAO joint conference
 - Support from UW-Stout
 - Spring 2018
 - Fostering Success at UWM Committee
 - Food pantry and mobile market
- Accomplishments

- Mission and services
 - Advising
 - 30-minute advising appointments, walk-ins offered twice a week
 - Sociocultural Programming
 - Latinx heritage month, LDF, altar Dia de los Muertos, brown bags, etc.
 - o Community Outreach & Participation
 - Puerto Rican Festival, Mexican Fiesta, UMOS events as well as UCC, etc.
 - PALM Latino Student Fund
 - Was started due to the need of students leaving UWM due to a few dollars. Many were close to graduation. These funds are unrestricted meaning they can be used for any need that they may have. US Citizenship is not required and you need a 2.22 GPA and have completed at least one semester. Grant comes out in Spring. Eligible for \$500
 - Raise money from the PALM graduation gala
 - Able to award about 18 grants last year
 - Hispanic Serving Institute (HSI) Initiative
 - Working on becoming HSI where 25% of student are Latinx
 - At ~12% right now
- Advising services in the RHC
 - Academic advising
 - Fall 2018: ~2,300 Latinx students on campus
 - 550 started as new students this Fall
 - 1,400 students assigned to the RHC
 - Changes in the RHC

- Rebecca and Gaby provide Academic Advising for the remaining Latinx students with a major in L&S who had been assigned to us as of Spring 2018. We will keep these students until they are all graduated and no longer receive new assignments as Academic Advisors.
- Beginning Summer 2018 they transitioned into a new title of Multicultural Student Success Coordinators and are now assigned as a Coach, on Navigate only, to all students who identify as Latinx regardless of S/C or program.
- Students are assigned by last name:
 - Gaby A-L
 - o Rebecca M-Z
- The main element that changed in their work with students with this
 dual-role is that we do not assist our Coach students with anything that
 their academic advisor does: course planning, degree progress, or
 anything specific to the major that we don't have the domain to serve
 in.
- Students should meet especially if they need help with:
 - Continued support through graduation
 - Conversations about goal setting, time management, connections to campus and community resources, financial aid conversations, networking opportunities, connection and sense of belonging to campus, involvement opportunities, etc.
 - Enrolling in classes and building a schedule based on what's recommended by the Academic Advisor
- Purpose of meeting with the RHC is to serve the student and provide support in areas that academic advisors may not have the time for because of the focus on degree planning and course selections

Student Success Center Updates: Nicole Oswald, Kay Eilers, Brennan O'Lena & Ariel Milton-Kern

- What is the Student Success Center?
 - Vision: our vision is to promote and deliver innovative programs that drive student success.
 - Mission: The Student Success Center connects UW-Milwaukee students to peers, faculty, staff, and resources throughout our campus community to support the personal and academic success of each student. We provide students a variety of academic and support services to empower them to achieve and succeed. The SSC fulfills this mission by providing:
 - Peer mentoring, supplemental instruction, tutoring, success coaching, academic skill development, bridge programs
- Peer mentoring
 - All new freshman and transfer students are assigned
 - Peer mentors are sophomores, juniors or seniors
 - Some are assigned based on connection to a first-year course
 - o Peer mentor assignments are in Navigate (referred to as a tutor in Navigate)
 - Students can meet with their mentor as frequently as needed
- Success coaching
 - Success coaches are assigned to students in specific programs including MKE Scholars,
 Summer Bridge and Fund for Wisconsin Scholars
 - Success coaches meet with students bi-weekly/monthly to support students with navigating college and developing success strategies
 - Some students potentially have multiple success coaches identified across campus. They
 are encouraged to use all resources available to them.
 - Our coach team does utilize Navigate to track appointments > "Quick Notes" system (listed as Coach)
- Tutoring and Supplemental Instruction (SI)
 - Tutoring Available for many 100-200 level courses, some 300 level courses
 - Have to make appointment for tutoring
 - Supplemental Instruction Available for many large lecture-styles courses
 - Students can just walk-in during SI hours
 - Hold exam reviews before class tests
 - Walk-In Tutoring Available for math, physics and chemistry

- Bolton 180 math walk-in tutoring is all together (M-R: 8 am-8 pm, F: 8 am-3 pm)
- Physics East Wing of Library
- Chemistry East Wing of Library
- Academic Skills Tutoring Cover topics including notetaking, study strategies, time management and test-taking
- Residence hall tutoring is still happening

 - All services and assignments are now in EAB Navigate
 - Academic skills tutoring is a new service this year
 - The math walk-in tutoring for Math 92-234
 - No longer using the "PASS" name

- Where can students go?
 - Any student can study in almost any country in the world
 - UWM sponsors summer, UWinteriM, semester, and year-long programs in over 38 countries
 - Students don't just have to study abroad they can also do an internship abroad
- Program types
 - o Programs available to fit all students' interests and needs
 - Exchange direct enroll at partner university, best for an independent student

- Study abroad more on-site support (may have faculty program leader) and program options (i.e. excursions), may have fewer course options
- Semester and academic year
- Summer, spring break, UWinteriM (majority are faculty-led)
- Internships
- Non-UWM sponsored programs
- Highlight: faculty-led programs
 - We work with faculty from all schools and colleges to develop programs for students
 - 25+ summer & 5+ UWinteriM faculty-led programs annually
 - Business: Europe, Australia, Asia
 - Information Studies: Canada, South Africa, Scotland
 - Nursing: Ecuador, Kenya, Malawi, Thailand
 - Social Welfare: Austria, Costa Rica, South Africa
 - Architecture & Urban Planning: France, Italy, Japan, Scandinavia, Netherlands, Cuba
