 - 1. International travel is on pause, but <u>there are still study abroad experiences onsite</u> and online.
 - 2. The education abroad industry has expanded international virtual study and internship programs for academic credit.
 - 3. Currently accepting Winterim and Spring 2021 applications through Oct. 1 (as of now). UWM leadership will make a decision about study abroad programs in early October. Students are being advised to have a plan B in case study abroad programs do not run register for UWM courses and secure housing for that term.

 - 1. Not on active SEVIS record in the spring
