Core Curriculum Focuses On

- Community-based organizations: how they work and skills for working within them
- K-12 education: core foundations of urban education and students placed at risk*
- Community organizing and development: how to work in communities and foster change and leadership
 *students do not earn K-12 teacher certification

Focus Areas Include

- Community-Based Organizations
- Community Engagement and Community Development
- Race Relations and Antiracist Education
- Social Policy and Inequality

Overview of the Degree

39 Credits in the Major

- 12 Lower Division Credits
- 12 Upper Division Credits of Required Classes
- 12 Elective Credits in Educational Policy Department
- 3 Credits of Advanced Expository Writing

Other Requirements

- 42 Credits of Lower Division Electives (essentially, anything)
- 12 Credits of 300-Level Electives or above
- 24 Credits of General Education Requirements (GER)

Course Options and Credits

Entire degree can be completed either

- Fully online
- Almost fully face to face
- Combining face to face and online
- Weekend and half-semester course offerings

Credit Earning Options

- Up to 42 lower-division elective credits for prior professional educational experience (only pay tuition for first 3 earned, the rest are free)
- Military transcripted credits
- Articulation agreements with multiple technical colleges in human services, business, education, and leadership.
- Policy accepting non-transferring AAS credits from completed degrees as lower-division credits

Where Do Graduates Work?

33% in K-12 Education

- Non-teaching staff in public schools
- Teachers and administrators in charter and private schools
- K-12 public school teachers after post-bacc licensure.

31% in Public Agencies and Nonprofit Organizations

 After school program directors, community organizers, case managers, community educators, branch directors of agencies, and a wide range of other positions.

17% in Child Care

Often as owners and directors of child care centers

12% in Higher Education

Often as academic advisors, usually after pursuing an MS degree.

Key Statistics

African American Graduation Rate

- Six-year UWM African American graduation rate: 25%
- Four-year CEED African American graduation rate: 46% (2010-2017 average)

- CEED: 77% Female* *2009-2018 average

 A submajor accepted by the Wisconsin Registry preparing students to direct and teach in child care centers.
