RESEARCH IN PROGRESS

Children's Cities: Understanding Children's Experiences of Place and Identity through Art. In this project, I explore the experiences and understandings of race, place, and power through the voices and artwork of a group of Black and Latinx children, aged six through fifteen, experiencing homelessness in the Bronx, New York. I have completed the data-collection phase of this project and am currently analyzing data. I presented initial findings at the Society for the Study of Human Development conference in 2022 and will be presenting additional findings at the Society for Research on Adolescence annual meeting in 2023.
