

## **UWM Global Scholars Curriculum Guide**

We recommend that students in **UWM Global Scholars** enroll in 12-15 credits (18 credits is the maximum). Most courses at UWM are 3 credits each. With the assistance of your Global Scholars advisor, you will select courses that help you meet your educational and career goals. Prior to enrollment, you should also consult with your home institution academic advisor to determine how your study abroad courses will transfer back to your home institution.

Please note that you will only be able to register for courses for which you have met the prerequisites; for example, an upper-level Economics course will require that you have already taken introductory-level Economics. In some cases, it may be possible to gain special enrollment permission from the course instructor, after consulting with your Global Scholars advisor.

Global Scholars students will be required to enroll in two Global Studies courses, listed below. Additionally, students will choose up to three additional courses that meet their academic needs.

### **(1) Multicultural America (3 credits, 1 course)**

#### **Anthropology/Art/English/Film/History/Sociology/Urban Studies/Women's Studies 150: Multicultural America**

*Cross-cultural study of U.S. ethnic and racial identities through materials from literature, history, and the media, with attention to African-, Asian, Hispanic-, and Native-American experiences. Required service learning component of approximately 15 hours during the semester. This course is offered through multiple departments and students may choose which department's offering of this course is the best match with their interests.*

### **(2) Global Studies Core (3-6 credits, 1-2 courses)**

#### **Global 101: People and Politics**

*Fundamental aspects of globalization; how economic, political, and cultural globalism affects contemporary societies.*

#### **Global 201: Economics and the Environment**

*Links between international trade and environmental change; conditions related to global economy; political impact of environmental change; human dimensions of international trade and environmental change.*

#### **Global 202: Globalization and Technology**

*Globalization and information technology; history of and current trends in global transfer of technology; contemporary issues in information technology; media convergences and divisions.*

### **(3) Electives (3-9 credits, 1-3 courses)**
