#### **Accomplishments**

Leslie Harris, Erin Salhstein Parcell, Portia Cobb, and Debra Gillipie have received a grant from Villanova University's Waterhouse Family Institute for the Study of Communication and Society (WFI) for the Gun Violence Project.
