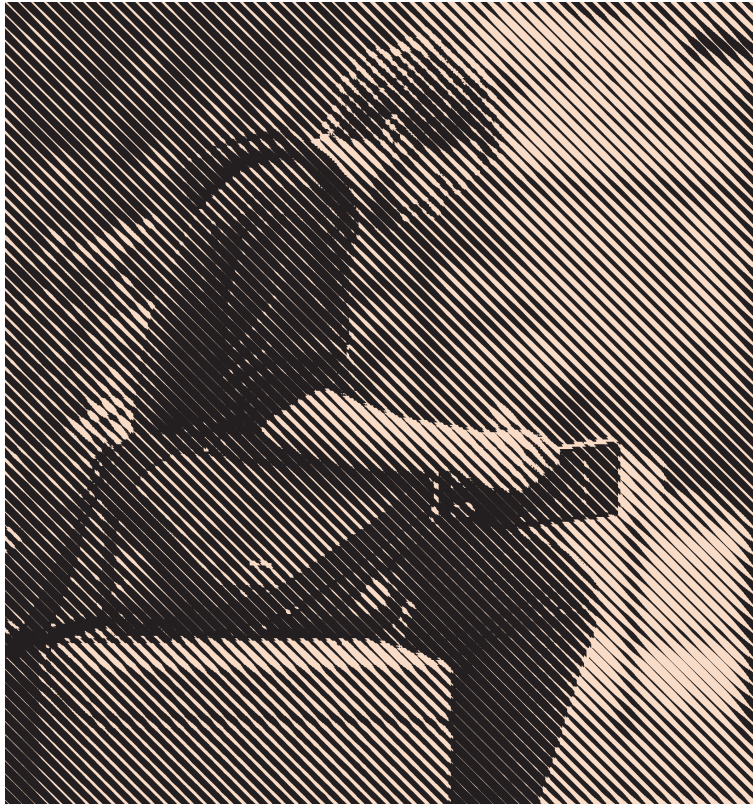
The Student Support Team (SST) is a multi-unit team that assists the campus community and identifies resources, strategies, and interventions that may help students who face significant challenges, including mental health issues, trauma, and financial concerns. Campus community members who are connected to the student of concern may be invited for consultation. The DOS Office coordinates follow-up and case management.

Student Support cases increased significantly in 2021-2022, including financial insecurity and mental health reports. In addition, the Dean of Students Office is becoming more well known among staff, faculty and students as being a resource for students, including awarding emergency grants.

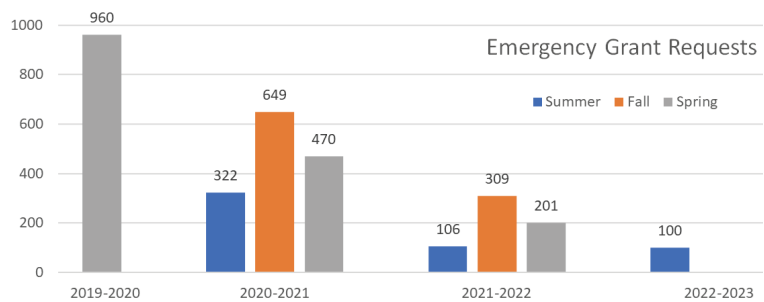

# Emergency Grants Report



## October 2020 and beyond: The Chancellor's Student Success Fund (CSSF)

In Fall 2020, the Office began to use the Chancellor's Student Success Fund to assist students in need.

In Spring 2021, the Office provided students funds from the CSSF. During that semester, students could apply to receive HEERF II funds; however, undocumented and international students were not eligible for HEERF II funds.

In Fall 2021, the Office paused the emergency grant process to allow for students to apply for HEERF III funds (from August 2 to September 13), which international and undocumented students were eligible for, allowing for a smoother award cycle. When the Office restarted the emergency grant process, it received more applications than it had funding for. To ensure the maximum amount of students received funding and increase use of the CSSF, the Office ensured first that students had received HEERF funds and, if they hadn't, awarded those funds first.

This allowed for more students to be granted HEERF III funds and it gave the Office an opportunity to stretch out our UWM Emergency Grant Funds.

Starting in Fall 2022, the Office started to heavily focus on federal supports and other resources, in addition to emergency grants. We shared with emergency grant reviewers that students who have a 0 EFC on FAFSA were eligible for Food Share and Broadband assistance. These are strategies to help students improve their financial circumstances.

The majority of violations during this year involved a violation of the alcohol and controlled substances policy; therefore, the most common sanction assigned was for alcohol and drug education (BASICS/BASICS II coupled with a reflection paper). If warranted, the Investigating Officer reviews the report and considers higher level university sanctions such as probation, suspension, and/or expulsion.

Multiple violations, including alcohol/drug incidents, sexual or gender-based violence violations, and egregious violations typically involve sanctions of suspension or expulsion.

Consultation and complaint cases about students include interpersonal concerns about students and/or consultations with faculty and staff about student behaviors which do not rise to the level of misconduct. Examples include situations where students' behavior is perceived to be rude, disrespectful, or disagreeable. These cases were tracked for the first time during the 2018-2019 academic year. Additionally, starting in fall 2019, complaints against students were categorized by type of complaint or concern.

Previously such situations were categorized as non-academic misconduct cases, desk files, and general complaints. Several of those situations were now tracked as complaints.

Each year, new categories are added as we identify patterns in complaints. Concern counts are provided for each year that the concern category is available for tracking.

Since 2010, the Dean of Students (DOS) Office began management of academic misconduct. In general, instructors determine the sanctions for their courses. For egregious cases or for a student who has multiple incidents, an Investigating Officer will review the case and consider university sanctions (beyond the scope of the course) such as probation, suspension, or expulsion. The most common sanctions are "lower grade on assignment/test," "failing grade in the course," followed by "lower grade in the course." As noted above, the Academic Misconduct Hearing Committee does not uphold all recommended sanctions of expulsion.
