UWM French and the Union Theatre present The 22nd Annual Festival of Films in French

February 15-24, 2019

Music and mayhem fill the backdrop to the 22nd UWM Festival of Films in French (February 15-24, 2019). Featured on the big screen are titans of Jazz (Josephine Baker, Django Reinhardt, Miles Davis), peerless, dearly departed Charles Aznavour, a Kinshasa club singer, a travelling folk group, and even a heavy metal depiction of Joan of Arc's childhood in Bruno Dumont's Jeannette. The festival jumps forward from the Middle Ages to Paris in the roaring twenties (La Revue des revues), to World War II (Django, Un Taxi pour Tobrouk, Un Sac de billes) and to the 1960s and 1970s feminist movement in films by Agnès Varda and Catherine Corsini that offer deep context to today's #metoo movement. Other ethical controversies are also explored including ethnographic studies (*Petit à petit*), GMOs (*Modifié*), marijuana's decriminalization (*Les* Mauvaises Herbes) crimes of passion (Ascenseur pour l'échafaud), reality TV and the judicial system (*Ni juge ni soumise*). As usual, the festival provides thrilling armchair travel - we will go down to Death Valley (Valley of Love) and up to the Alps (Belle et Sébastien 3), from Paris to Brussels and Amsterdam, to France's Mediterranean coast (L'Atelier), from urban to rural Quebec, to crossing the North African desert, to a race against time on Kinshasa's streets in the Democratic Republic of Congo (Félicité), and even to Iran (L'Une chante, l'autre pas). So come in from the winter and buckle your UWM cinema seatbelts!

This tribute to world famous guitarist and composer Django Reinhardt is set in wartime Paris when he and his family were pursued by the Nazis owing to their gypsy heritage.


