Learning Objectives/Course Goals

In this course, students will explore issues related to language learning and language teaching and the linkage between theory, research, and practice. We will consider, evaluate, and challenge research, as well as our own assumptions about language learning and teaching.

The principal goals of this course parallel the scope of the textbook we will be reading: "The main aim of this book is to communicate to those concerned with language teaching some of the ideas about how people acquire second languages that emerge from second language acquisition (SLA) research, and to make suggestions of how these might benefit language teaching. It is not a guide to SLA research methodology itself, or to the merits and failings of particular SLA research techniques... Nor is it an overall guide to the methods and techniques of language teaching; only to those which are related to an SLA research perspective" (p. 1).

Students will read scholarly journal articles with an eye toward critical analysis, engage in discussion, both in class and on the class forum, and gain hands-on experience designing a research study.

Assessment

The final grade for this course will be determined according to the following percentages:

- **10%** Journal article abstract: Each student will prepare a written abstract and critical evaluation of an assigned article. Students will present their summary briefly in class.
- **5% Leading class discussion**: Following the presentation of his/her summary, the student will lead the class discussion on the article.
- **20% Preparation and participation** includes careful reading of assignments (chapters from the book and journal articles) in advance of class; making substantive contributions in class and on the MALLT 706 forum; your willingness to work with partners and in small groups; and thorough completion of assignments on time.
- **15 % Annotated bibliography**: Students will annotate a minimum of ten scholarly research articles directly relevant to their paper topic. This assignment will help in writing the review of the literature for the seminar paper.
- **40%** Seminar paper: Students will write a detailed research study proposal for this seminar but are not required to carry out the study or collect any data. The following sections will be due as separate assignments during the semester:
 - 1) topic identification & "mini" introduction (i.e., what do you propose studying and why?)
 - 2) introduction
 - 3) review of the literature
 - 4) methodology & procedures
 - 5) conclusion
 - 6) final draft of complete paper
- **10%** Take-home final: The take-home final will be due during finals week.
