Course Objective:

This course is designed to help you learn to communicate in Polish. It will involve the four basic skills: speaking, listening, reading, and writing.

Learning Objectives:

1. Acquiring basic vocabulary
2. Learning basic Polish language grammar
3. Using grammatical structures in new contexts
4. Learning basic conversational patterns
5. Gaining cultural insights pertaining to Poland

Classroom directives:

1. Attendance is mandatory
2. Active participation in class
3. Homework turned in on time
4. For every class period, you should spend at least two hours in preparation.

Grading:

1. Your grade will be based on your classroom participation, homework, two one-hour tests, and final examination (which counts as two tests).

Evaluation points:

Preparation (including homework)	20%
Classroom participation	20%
Tests	20%
Final examination	40%

Preparation (20%) Preparation consists of assigned homework and familiarity with the vocabulary and grammar covered in class. No extra credit will be given for missed assignments.

Participation (20%) The participation grade will be based on your ability to answer questions and to work with a partner and in a group.

Tests (20%) Two fifty-minute tests will be given, valued at 10% each. They will be announced in advance. They will consist of 10 sections, 5 sentences each, each correct answer valued at 2 points.

Final examination (40%) It will be structured like a test and will include the major grammatical points covered in the course.
