Ryan Sorenson is a 2016 graduate of UW-Milwaukee. Ryan majored in Political Science and minored in History. While at UWM, Ryan was involved in student government (all four years) and served as President of the Student Association his Junior year. Currently, Ryan works at a local nonprofit that helps survivors of domestic violence, as a community engagement coordinator. In 2017, Ryan was elected to the Sheboygan City Council after defeating a 10-year incumbent. On the council, he is the Chair of the Committee of the Whole, Chair of the Public Safety Committee, Vice Chair for the Public Works Committee, and is a member of the Transit Commission, Capital Improvement Commission, International Committee, and the Maywood Park Board.



Jonathan Brostoff is a 2011 graduate of UWM Political Science. He is and always has been dedicated to public service via volunteer work, work for non-profits including AmeriCorps, and via his current position as State Representative for Assembly District 19, covering Milwaukee's East Side (including UWM), downtown, Riverwest, and Bay View.
