SURF and UR@UWM Students Keeping Busy Tracking Supreme Court Appearances

In lieu of a formal "Letter from the Chair," I thought I'd spotlight my undergraduate students - Kimberly Carver, Delaney Deleske, David Gomez, and Inaara McCray - who have been or will be engaged in conducting research with me thanks to funding from UWM's fantastic SURF (Support for Undergraduate Research Fellows) program (details here). Kimberly graduated in May 2023 (She's a 1L at Indiana's Maurer School of Law and, by all accounts, doing great!) and we are grateful to her for her work on the project, coding appearances by Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg. Delaney just finished up her time with me so that she can focus on finishing up her degree, and she coded every appearance made by Supreme Court Justices Amy Coney Barrett, Sonia Sotomayor, David Souter, and John Paul Stevens between 2000 and 2021. First-year student David Gomez joined this summer as part of the UR@UWM program for incoming students (read more about that program here) and is working on tracking Justice Kavanaugh's appearances, and Inaara McCray, an Honors College first-year student, just finished her training and is readying to start coding Justice Elena Kagan. It is incredibly fun to work with this energetic bunch of undergrads, though their coding is likely not always super fun -- social science data collection can be tedious -- but we're excited to have a definitive picture of the over-time and across-justices differences in appearances so that we can test some hypotheses about their effect on public perceptions of the Court, and without them, we would not be nearly as far along in the process. Our plan is to send at least a descriptive paper, co-authored by all these great undergraduate researchers along with our team at SUNY Binghamton, this spring for publication consideration at a peer-reviewed journal. We'll update you!



Spotlight: Faculty

Professor Emeritus Don Pienkos (at UWM 1969-2013) has lead an interesting life, both as Professor of Political Science where he was involved with certificate programs, the international studies major, and our Pi Sigma Alpha student honor society, and in terms of advocating for the entry of Poland, the Czech Republic, and Hungary into NATO. In that work, he was able to meet and interact with some important figures. He recently wrote a letter to the editor of *The Polish Review* recalling his experiences and situating them into the current bid by Ukraine to join NATO and he shared it with us. We thought you might want to take a peek:

Remembering Poland's Entry into NATO

Back in 1995 and 1999 I authored two articles in *The Polish Review* on Poland's effort to gain entry into the NATO Allliance, the Polish American Congress' key role in this endeavor, and my involvement from 1993 to 1999 in this ultimately successful enterprise.* Here is a brief "post script" on my experience. It comes at a timely moment, in connection with NATO's, and Poland's, response to Russia's invasion of Ukraine. In sharing my story with your readers I am well aware that other ordinary citizens who worked for Poland's entry into NATO likely did far more significant



things. Unfortunately, I have not seen any reference to this in print. So here's my story 'for the record.'

It all began in December 1997 when I got a telephone call from Ryszard Sarkowicz, Poland's Consul General in Chicago. He said he had been in contact with Wisconsin State Senator Richard Grobschmidt, whose district included many Polish Americans. The Senator had agreed to submit a resolution supporting Poland's entry into NATO and to work for its approval in both houses of the state legislature.

In fact, Senator Grobschmidt, a Democrat, and his colleagues, Democrats Roger Breske, Brian Burke and Kevin Shibilski, and Republicans Gary Drzewiecki and Robert Welch had already authored such a resolution, joined by 13 concurring sponsors in the State Assembly, Democrats Peter Bock, Barbara Gronemus, Donald Hasenohrl, James Kreuser, Walter Kunicki, Jeff Plale, Rosemary Potter, and John Ryba, and Republicans John Dobyns, John Gard, Joseph Handrick, Alvin Ott, and Scott Walker.

The resolution had been referred to the Senate committee on Economic Development, Housing, and Government Operations. It gave six reasons for approval – most notably that Poland, as a free and democratic country, was indeed prepared to be a contributing NATO member, that it was in the U.S national interest to maintain and expand NATO to insure the peace, stability, and prosperity of post communist-ruled central Europe, and that NATO's mission would be enhanced by doing so.

The Senate committee scheduled a hearing on the resolution for January 7, 1998 in Madison, Wisconsin's capital. In my chat with the Consul General, he asked that I speak in its favor. At first I was skeptical – amending the NATO treaty to admit Poland, Hungary and the Czech Republic was the responsibility of the U.S. Senate in Washington, DC, not in Madison. When the Consul persisted I agreed to go. I then asked a friend, Terry Witkowski, a Milwaukee City government official and president of the influential Milwaukee Society lodge of the Polish National Alliance fraternal, to accompany me.

My testimony took all of about forty seconds! The Committee Chair, Senator Gwen Moore of Milwaukee, stopped me in mid-sentence and said, "Thank you Professor. I believe we are now prepared to act on this resolution." It was then approved by a 4-0 vote. Senate passage came days later, on January 15, 1998.

But Assembly approval was blocked due to a squabble between the Democrat-controlled Senate and the Republicancontrolled Assembly. I learned this from Senator Grobschmidt who was pessimistic about an early settlement of the dispute. But he did encourage me to call the Republican Speaker of the Assembly on the matter.

I did so and reached Rep. Gard (the Speaker's deputy). I asked why the Assembly was refusing to even take up the bill. At this point Rep. Gard asked me my name and where I lived! I gladly assured him I was a Wisconsin resident. Then I repeated my request, and in the strongest language I could muster.

Rep. Gard promised to call me back and indeed did so just 20 minutes later, saying that the Assembly would bring up the resolution the next week. On March 25, the Assembly gave its approval and in a concurring resolution.

The joint resolution was then immediately forwarded to the President of the United States, the President pro tem of the U.S. Senate, the two U.S. Senators from Wisconsin, Herbert Kohl and Russell Feingold, and Poland's Ambassador to the U.S.

On April 30, 1998 the U.S. Senate approved extending NATO membership to Poland, Hungary and the Czech Republic and by a vote of 80-19. (67 votes were needed to amend the NATO treaty.)** Both U.S. Senators from Wisconsin voted for NATO expansion.*** Then, and only after all 16 NATO members had formally approved expansion, the three states joined NATO in April 1999, the fiftieth anniversary of its founding.

It had taken six long, tough years of lobbying to achieve this breakthrough; later expansions of NATO in 2004, 2009, 2018 and 2020 have since gone swiftly and smoothly. In 2022, with Finland and Sweden seeking to join NATO in the wake of the Russian invasion of Ukraine, the alliance was on the verge of including thirty-two member states with 950 million inhabitants.

Spotlight: PhD Program

Taraleigh Davis Begins the Fall as Assistant Professor of Political Science at Bradley University

Dr. Taraleigh Davis, who graduated with her PhD in May 2023, has recently been appointed as a tenure track Assistant Professor of Public Law and American Politics at Bradley University. Taraleigh teaches a range of courses, including constitutional law, judicial politics, international law, and American government.

Beyond teaching, Taraleigh has two articles from her dissertation currently under peer review. In addition, she has a co-authored publication with Professor Benesh, forthcoming in the *Emory Law Journal* (November 2023), titled "Procedural Justice and the Shadow Docket." Taraleigh is also serving as a Wiki Scholar with Wiki Education, contributing to knowledge dissemination on elections and electoral processes leading up to the 2024 election.

Taraleigh credits her time at UWM for providing a solid foundation for this new role. The experience gained from serving as both a Teaching Assistant and an Instructor was instrumental in shaping her pedagogical approach. Taraleigh extends special thanks to the faculty members who offered mentorship beyond the dissertation committee, enriching her academic journey and preparing her for a career in higher education.

Enes Ayasli Wins Grants for Dissertation Research in Turkey

PhD Candidate Enes Ayasli is spending the year in Turkey, having secured a prestigious research grant from the European Union Delegation for his work on native attitudes and how they shape perspectives on refugees, using experimental methods. This grant serves as a testament to the practical significance of his work as well as to his commitment to advancing not only theoretical knowledge in his field but also to actively contribute to the formulation of informed public policy recommendations. By engaging with key decision-makers, he seeks to bridge the gap between academic research and tangible policy outcomes in the context of migration.

Enes will use this grant to (1) field an online survey experiment and (2) conduct focus groups with a representative sample of Turkish citizens. He is also interviewing Syrian refugees for a separate project on his research agenda. He is exploring what natives think about the return migration of refugees, trying to uncover reasons why and

when natives demand the return of refugees by proposing a novel theory. Notably, this theory is built upon insights gained from his prior field research conducted in 2021, culminating in a comprehensive and impactful research agenda with real-world implications for migration policies in Turkey as well as other host countries.

Enes has also been awarded the Wilder Crane Memorial Scholarship and the Graduate Student Excellence Fellowship for his academic performance and engagement in the field of study. While we miss him here in Milwaukee, we are very excited to hear what he learns in Turkey.
