Rationale: [Rationale for how these programs are related]

Northcentral Technical College offers a two-year degree in Human Services- Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse (AODA) that focuses on preparing students to provide social services such as education, support, care, advocacy and/or crisis intervention with a focus on issues of substance abuse and counseling. Increasingly Graduates are motivated to pursue a bachelor's degree, in order to enhance their skills and knowledge base, and to meet requirements for a variety of careers working with individuals, groups, and communities. The University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee's baccalaureate degree program in Community Engagement and Education (CEED) provides students with a deep understanding of urban educational issues with a focus on the historical, political, economic and socio-cultural context of communities, schools and society. The program prepares students for a variety of non-school educational careers working in community-based and social service agencies focused on improving the lives of individuals of all ages, groups, and communities. In addition, the CEED BS degree program can be completed online, offering increased access for NTC students. Key components of both degrees include: cultural awareness, understanding of diverse cultural groups, and a commitment to social justice by supporting people and improving the communities in which we live.

This articulation between the Northcentral Technical College (NTC) Human Services-AODA Associate program, and the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee (UWM) Community Engagement and Education program formally recognizes the transfer of credits from the NTC Human Services AAS program and outlines an efficient path to baccalaureate degree completion at UWM.

Requirements:

- Students transferring to the UWM Community Engagement and Education (CEED) baccalaureate
 program must meet the regular University requirements for admission. Admission to UWM does
 NOT guarantee admission to the CEED program in the UWM School of Education. Acceptance
 into the UWM CEED program is based upon academic and non-academic criteria determined by
 the Department of Educational Policy and Community Studies.
- 2. To be eligible to apply for admission to the Community Engagement and Education program in the School of Education, students must meet the following condition: 2.0 cumulative grade point average on transferable credits (it must be emphasized that 2.0 GPA is the minimum and does not guarantee acceptance into the professional program).

- 3. Credits for courses in this agreement will only be granted if a student has earned a grade of C (2.0) or better.
- 4. The maximum number of credits that can be transferred from NTC to UWM is 72.
- 5. The UWM baccalaureate candidate must meet UWM's General Education and Cultural Diversity Requirements.
- 6. NTC Associate Degree in Human Services must be posted on official transcript in order for students to receive credits from the agreement.
- 7. Student must have begun their Associate Degree from NTC within the last 10 years of being admitted to UWM. NTC student must have an Associate Degree in Human Services earned after December 31, 2005. Course work must have been taken since January 1, 2002.
- 8. Course equivalencies used in this articulation agreement are subject to change in the event that the course curriculum of the NTC Human Services Associate Program, or the UWM Community Engagement and Education program undergoes revision.

NTC/UWM Course Equivalencies:

Students earning the Associate Degree in Human Services-AODA from Northcentral Technical College (NTC) will be able to transfer the credits listed in Table 1 toward the Community Engagement and Education Bachelor's degree program in the School of Education at University of Wisconsin – Milwaukee (UWM).

Program-to-program transfer courses/credits are accepted only for the program/degree specified in this agreement. A change of major/degree/program invalidates these courses/credits for transfer unless they are approved within some other Program-to-Program Articulation Agreement for a different major/degree/program at UW-Milwaukee.
