**Agreement Description and Rationale:**

Gateway Technical College (Gateway) offers a two-year Human Service Associate degree that focuses on preparing students for entry level positions in a variety of human & social service programs such as education, counseling support, care, advocacy and/or crisis intervention related to issues involving mental health, child & family welfare, gerontology, substance abuse, and correctional processes. Increasingly, graduates are motivated to pursue a bachelor’s degree in order to enhance their skills and knowledge base and to meet requirements for a variety of careers working with individuals, groups, and *communities*. The University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee’s baccalaureate degree program in Community Engagement and Education (CEED) provides students with a deep understanding of urban educational issues with a focus on the historical, political, economic, and socio-cultural context of communities, schools, and society. The program prepares students for a variety of non-school educational careers working in community-based and social service agencies focused on improving the lives of individuals of all ages, groups, and communities. In addition, the CEED BS degree program can be completed online, offering increased access for Gateway students. Key components of both degrees include: developing cultural competence, cultivating community engagement, thinking critically and creatively, understanding of diverse cultural groups, and a commitment to social justice by supporting people and improving the communities in which we live.

This articulation agreement between Gateway’s Human Service Associate program and the UWM Community Engagement and Education BS program formally recognizes the transfer of credits from Gateway and outlines an efficient path to baccalaureate degree completion at UWM.

**Admission Requirements/Conditions:**

Students must meet all standard UWM admissions requirements to be eligible for participation in this agreement. Information on transfer admissions requirements may be found at [transfer.uwm.edu](http://transfer.uwm.edu).

In addition, the following conditions will apply:

- A 2.0 cumulative grade point average on previously attempted credits.
- Admission to UWM does not guarantee admission to the CEED program in the UWM School of Education. Acceptance into the UWM CEED program is based upon academic and non-academic criteria determined by the Department of Education Policy and Community Studies.

**Articulation Transfer Agreement Terms:**

The terms of this agreement apply to Gateway students who successfully complete the AAS Human Service Associate degree, meet the conditions set forth below for UWM’s School of Education, and enroll in the BS in Community Engagement & Education.

The AAS Human Service Associate degree will transfer to UWM's BS in Community Engagement & Education in accordance with the following:

- A minimum of 60 credits earned toward the AAS degree will transfer as stipulated in Appendix A.
- A maximum of 72 credits can be transferred from Gateway to UWM.
- The Gateway AAS Human Service Associate degree must be posted on an official transcript in order for this agreement to be applied.
  - Students actively enrolled in the AAS degree and expecting to complete it prior to enrollment may be admitted under the general terms of this agreement, pending receipt of a final, degree-bearing transcript.
- Course equivalencies specified in this articulation agreement are subject to change in the event that either curriculum for the Human Service Associate AAS degree or CEED program undergoes revision.

All credits applied to associate degree requirements, whether earned through Gateway coursework, accepted in transfer, or earned through prior learning assessment, will be recognized and evaluated as applied by Gateway, subject to the conditions above.

Program-to-program transfer courses/credits are accepted only for the program/degree specified in this agreement. A change of major/degree/program may invalidate these courses/credits for transfer unless they are approved within some other transfer agreement for a different major/degree/program at UWM.

Coursework taken in addition to what is required for the associate degree will be evaluated on a course-by-course basis and transferred in accordance with routine UWM transfer policy. Information on the transferability of specific, non-articulating courses may be found in the Transfer Equivalency Database (TED) ([ted.uwm.edu](http://ted.uwm.edu)) or the Transfer Wisconsin (TIS) website ([www.wisconsin.edu/transfer](http://www.wisconsin.edu/transfer)). For UWM General Education Requirement (GER) transfer equivalencies, refer to Appendix B.

#### **Graduation Requirements/Policies:**

In addition to meeting all General Education and major requirements, students must satisfy the following to receive the BS in Community Engagement & Education at UWM:

- A minimum total of 120 credits, at least 30 of which are earned at UWM.
- A cumulative GPA of 2.000.

A transfer course/credit articulation table showing how the AAS Human Service Associate degree from Gateway transfers to UWM's BS in Community Engagement & Education appears in Appendix A. Some coursework may be combined to meet requirements within the BS in Community Engagement & Education. Also, some courses that ordinarily do not transfer may do so under the terms of this agreement. Without associate degree completion, some coursework/equivalencies outlined in this agreement may not transfer as indicated.

#### **Institutional Commitment:**

This agreement is based on curricula in place for the 2019 academic year. Students who completed the AAS Human Service Associate degree under an earlier curriculum may transfer under the general terms of this agreement to the extent possible given differences in requirements. The terms of this agreement are valid for a period of three years. Both Gateway and UWM agree to provide periodic updates in the instance that requirements for either of the programs change. At the end of the effective period, the terms of the agreement will be reviewed, updated as necessary, and continued if agreed upon by both parties.

In the instance either school wishes to end the agreement, 180-day advanced notice is required. Any students who have applied, been admitted, and/or have matriculated while the agreement was active will be allowed to continue under its original terms.

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The following table outlines a typical transfer scenario, showing how the associate degree curriculum applies to the bachelor's degree and which requirements remain to complete at UWM. To maximize credit transfer, some substitutions may be identified. While every effort is made to maximize credit transfer, lack of alignment between degree programs and levels of instruction may require students to exceed 120 credits to meet all graduation requirements. Transfer results will differ based on individual students' transcripts.

## Appendix B: University General Education Requirements (GER)

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General Education Requirements (GER) are intended to give structure to each student’s education while providing the student the greatest possible freedom to design an individual academic program. These requirements include two major categories: **competency** and **distribution**.

**Competency** requirements are designed to assure proficiency in oral and written communication (OWC Parts A & B), quantitative literacy (QL Parts A & B), & foreign languages.

**Distribution** requirements are designed to provide students with a broad body of knowledge in the areas of the arts, humanities, natural sciences, and social sciences as a foundation for specialization.

The table below outlines the University of Wisconsin-Milwaukee’s GER requirements. Note that College of Letters and Science majors must complete GER coursework beyond what is listed here. Some programs/majors will require specific coursework for certain competency and distribution requirements. Consult with an advisor early in your academic career to ensure that you choose the best coursework for your intended program of study.

Successfully passing two consecutive semesters of college-level instruction in a single foreign language, or 3. Demonstrating foreign language ability equivalent to two semesters of a single foreign language by earning a satisfactory score on an approved placement, proficiency, departmental, or other examination.

Arts	3	A course in history, philosophy, theory, or practice of the creative and interpretive arts.
Humanities	6	Two courses from an approved list.

Natural Sciences	6	At least two courses; one must include laboratory or field experience illustrating the generation and testing of data and the application of concepts and knowledge to the solution of problems.
Social Sciences	6	Two courses from an approved list.
Cultural Diversity	0-3	As part of the distribution requirements, one course must pertain to the study of the life experiences of African Americans, Latino/Hispanic Americans, American Indians, or Asian Americans.
