Anne Dressel is an Assistant Professor in the College of Nursing, where she also serves as Director of the Center for Global Health Equity. 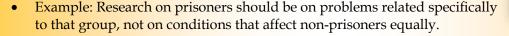

Focus on Ethics: Justice and Participant Selection

The Belmont Principle of Justice says that the those who bear the burden (risks) of research should be the ones to benefit from it, and vice versa. Those who will benefit from the research should be the ones undertaking the burden.

Don't do research on a group simply because they are more convenient.

Choose your population based on the research question, not based on convenience. This is particularly important in a group with diminished autonomy, such as children or the researchers' own students. Research whose results may benefit a wide range of groups should enroll a wide range of participants.





Don't exclude groups or individuals unnecessarily.

Just as it is unethical to include only vulnerable people, it is unethical to exclude people from the opportunity to participate in research without justification. This is especially critical when the research may have a direct benefit to participants.

Excluding groups unnecessarily can also undermine the scientific validity of your research.

Example: In the past, psychology research was frequently conducted on male college-age students.
 Females were excluded due to "hormone fluctuations". But to what extent can you really extrapolate
 results from 18-22 year old males to all humans? There may be significant psychological differences
 due to age, gender, or many other qualities.



Human subjects research that will be used for a dissertation requires IRB review.

Dissertations are a student's official entry into the world of academia. As such, even if they're not published in a journal or book format, they are considered research that is "designed to create or contribute to generalizable knowledge", which, according to federal regulations, requires IRB approval.



PI and SPI Training Requirements



Reminder: CITI training is now required for all PIs and student PIs.

If you submit a new study to the IRB, or if you are the PI for your student's study, you must have current CITI training on file.

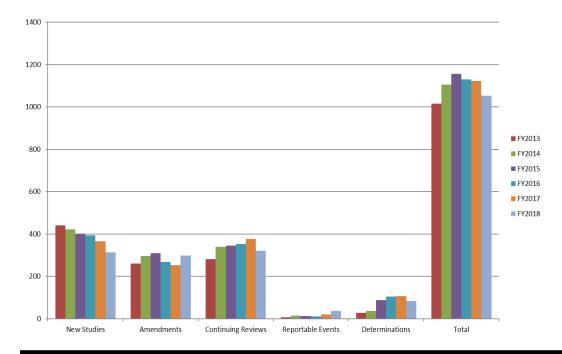
We will not issue IRB approval unless **both** the PI and SPI have completed CITI training within the last 3 years.

IRB Metrics

Fiscal Year 2018

- 1228 active studies
- 54% of new study submissions are being done as part of a student project, dissertation, or thesis.
- March was the month with the most new study submissions (38), and September had the fewest (18)
- IRB staff trained approximately 300 people in 29 in-person sessions
- 907 individuals completed online training through CITI
