

Majors in Two Different Schools/Colleges – REVISION  
S-38

Rationale

Effective in the 2018-19 academic year, UW-Milwaukee offers two distinct types of degree programs at the undergraduate level, bachelor and associate. Due to differences in tuition schedules and requirements for financial aid reporting, it is not possible for a student to formally pursue an associate degree and bachelor's degree at the same time. This policy revision is intended to distinguish between undergraduate students pursuing two bachelor's degrees simultaneously, which is allowed by the policy, and students pursuing an associate degree and bachelor's degree at the same time, which is not allowed.

Policy Revision - Tracked

A student who has satisfactorily completed all of the [bachelor's](#) degree requirements established by two different schools or colleges for graduation and the requirements for completing a major in those two units may receive two different [bachelor's](#) diplomas for one graduation period. The transcript will show that the person has completed the two majors and has been awarded the appropriate degrees. This policy does not interfere with the rules and regulations existing in a given school or college for completion of two majors within that unit.

Policy Revision – Clean

A student who has satisfactorily completed all of the bachelor's degree requirements established by two different schools or colleges for graduation and the requirements for completing a major in those two units may receive two different bachelor's diplomas for one graduation period. The transcript will show that the person has completed the two majors and has been awarded the appropriate degrees. This policy does not interfere with the rules and regulations existing in a given school or college for completion of two majors within that unit.
