- IV. Approval of the Minutes from the February 11, 2020 APCC Meeting

- VI. New Business:
  - 1. UWX Curricular Area

Andrew Kincaid moved to approve the new curricular area. Christy Greenleaf seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

## 2. Freshwater Sciences, BS

This is a new program that would bring in new people and invigorate both the undergraduate and graduate programs. Water is a huge issue in our society right now. UWM has a lot of great programs, but the fundamental difference is that none of them have water as the central focus. This will be the first undergraduate program of its kind.

They have enough faculty and staff to support a new degree program and are looking for suitable space on the Kenwood campus.

They expect to have about 15 students initially, and a strong cohort of 30/year in the future. They have a recruitment network already in place. They regularly have about 45 grad students, but often have to turn good students away for lack of funding – and undergrad program would provide TA opportunities for grad students.

Transformation from Grad School to offering an undergrad program – comparable to Public Health. The new degree gives us an opportunity to market to a whole new demographic. We have something very unique to offer and we should take advantage of it.

They've worked with an employer board to ensure they're offering the right kind of courses to meet employer needs. Employers say they want/need this.

Christy Greenleaf moved to approve the new degree. Stuart Moulthrop seconded, and the motion carried.

# 3. Occupational Science and Technology, BS – Name Change

Changing the name of the degree from Occupational Studies to Occupational Science and Technology.

Christy Greenleaf moved to approve the name change. David DiValerio seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

# 4. Undergraduate Program Review – Global Studies

The review team found that Global Studies is a popular and marketable program and recommended that the program should be continued. Further suggestions included: the creation of a Department-Like Body for International Studies and Global Studies; advocating for an annual budget; exploring ways to make MOUs binding for faculty who teach required coursework; and exploring domestic internships and other creative options to make the internship requirement more attainable for students.

Stuart Moulthrop moved to approve the program review. Andrew Kincaid seconded, and the motion carried.

### 5. Undergraduate Program Review – <u>Health Care Administration</u>

The review team found that Health Care Administration is an effective and necessary program in the College of Health Sciences and should be continued. Further recommendations included: collaboration with the Partners for Health on campus; continued growth of their strong alumni relationships; set the teaching load to 2/2 to maximize research activities and stability; increased funding and staffing; and additional faculty.

David DiValerio moved to approve the program review. Stuart Moulthrop seconded, and the motion passed unanimously.

VII. Adjournment. Christy Greenleaf moved to adjourn the meeting. Mark McBride seconded, and the meeting adjourned at 8:48 a.m.
