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PURPOSE OF COURSE

The purpose of this course is to provide students, especially those pursing a career in municipal government, an overview of issues and trends faced by local government managers. This will be accomplished by:

- 1. Providing a historical perspective of the evolution of municipal government and governance so that we may understand the current state of the profession in terms of municipal politics, board affairs, administrative relations, personnel administration, and management techniques used by the professional manager.
- 2. Providing in-depth insight into the current issues, challenges, demands of the political environment, and methods/practices required of municipal managers to successfully manage the day to day operations of a municipal entity.

A. Regular Attendance/Class participation (20% of final grade)

Expectations are that you are in attendance for and participate in every class. That means you will be required to read the assignments each week and prepared to discuss and raise questions regarding the assigned readings. Students are encouraged to read daily newspapers, professional journals and periodicals to obtain additional information on issues to be discussed.

B. Short-Topic Papers/Case studies (15% of final grade)

Two or three short-topic papers will be assigned—2 to 4 pages in length (double-spaced). These papers will be on a topic related to text book readings or current events. A list of topics will be provided, or you may request a subject that is not on the list. A case study for your analysis may also be substituted.

C. Outside Class Assignment 15% of final grade)

For this assignment, you will be required to attend three (3) of the following:

(1) Town Board, Village Board, County Board and/or City Council meeting. The Town Board meeting shall be a Town without an Administrator, The Village Board meeting shall be a place where there is Village Manager, and the City Council shall be a community of at least 20,000 in population. For the City Council/County Board option, please note the form of government and who acts as the community's chief executive.

During your observations; compare and contrast the three meetings you attended:

- 1. The discussion held on the agenda
- 2. The role of the:
 - a. Town Chairperson
 - b. Village Manager
 - c. Mayor/City Administrator or other Chief Executive
- 3. The behavior/discussion of the elected officials
- 4. The participation of the other people in attendance, other then the elected officials and Manager, i.e., citizens, other staff and consultant.

Interview two of the following: the Village Manager, City Administrator, Mayor, Alderperson, Town Chairperson, County Board Supervisor if possible for their insight on the process/activities/decisions.

You will be required to write a 4 - 7 page paper analyzing your observations, interview and class readings. At a minimum your paper must discuss the following issues:

- 1. Compare and contrast how the different entities worked together.
- 2. The actions/discussions/decisions of the elected body.
- 3. The role of the Town Chairperson, Manager/Administrator and Mayor played in the process.
- 4. Overall evaluation of the process, players, issues and outcomes and recommendations under each governmental unit.

This paper is due by the 10th class of the semester. You must provide proof that you were in attendance. **Typographical and grammatical errors will have a negative impact on your overall grade**, so proof read, spell check and review your papers before submitting them.

D. <u>Budget group project (5% of final grade) – In-Class Assignment</u>

In groups of three to four, evaluate the financial health of a community via audit reports, budgets, and long range financial plans. Class time will be allocated for the project. The group must do a presentation, answering the following questions:

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- a. What are the key trends in the financial health of the municipality?
 - Strengths
 - Weaknesses
 - Risks
 - Opportunities
- b. What recommendations do you foresee raising revenues via non-tax revenues?
- c. How did the budget utilize performance budgeting?

E. Course Project (25% of final grade)

The Course Project involves research of a local government issue, the completion of a 15-20 page paper documenting your research and analysis and an oral presentation of your project on a date to be assigned later in the course.

You may choose the topic as long as it deals with an important local government issue, and preferably vetted by me. You will be required to do a literature search, objectively present the substance of the issue, identify the players, interview relevant actors, identify the importance of the issue, examine the role of the Manager/Administrator with the issue, determine the most advantageous position for the municipality and present your findings. Topics must be submitted by the 4th of the semester. I would be glad to help you select a topic.

F. Final Exam (20% of final grade)

The Final Exam will be an essay style take home exam related to text book, lectures and discussions. The test will be distributed the second to last class and will be due the last night of class.

ACADEMIC HONESTY

Students are expected to conduct themselves responsibly and honestly. Specifically, handing in another student's work and plagiarism is prohibited. The first offense may result in a zero for that particular assignment or case. The second offense may result in an F for the course.
