## Call for Posters and Roundtable Presentations

**DEADLINE FOR ABSTRACTS: Friday, March 22nd, 2019**

The 24th Annual Student Research Forum will continue with the traditional **Poster Session** and also offer a new **Themed Roundtable** format focused on the broad topic of **Exclusionary Spaces** (see below).

**Roundtable Presentation Abstract:** Include **Topic, Student Name, Program**, and one paragraph-100 word description of your topic and how it relates to the overall theme of exclusionary spaces in a Word document. Also include 3-5 key questions that can be part of the roundtable discussion. The roundtable session will run from 2 - 2:55 PM. We will match presenters/moderators so it is not necessary to identify the other presenter, but you may provide the co-presenter if you would like to team up with someone.

**Poster Abstract:** Include **Title, Student Name, Program**, and one paragraph-100 description in a Word document. The posters are theme-free, and do not need to relate to the exclusionary spaces theme. The poster session will run from noon - 2pm on Friday, May 3 over lunch. We encourage poster presenters to consider presenting at a roundtable on the same topic as one's poster.

**Themed Roundtable:** students will participate as presenters/moderators for a small group/table on an area that relates to *Exclusionary Spaces*. The overall theme and each roundtable presentation can be understood broadly to relate to the many different manifestations of exclusion such as power, privilege, separation, inequality, and their accompanying dynamics and effects across multiple disciplinary lenses and methodologies. We are proposing the following topics for consideration in your proposal.

**Topics:** Food Justice, Health, Environment/Climate Justice, Immigration/Multicultural City, Gentrification, Transit, Public Space/Right to the City, Housing, Urban Economic Development, Mass Incarceration/Policing, Governance/Politics.

**Themed Roundtable Format:** There will be 3 roundtables. Each table will have at least two-presenters/moderators, with each presenting and acting as moderator. Presentations are limited to 10 minutes each. Roundtable presentations can be based off a particular paper, but can also be derived from more general knowledge/interest and/or one's current research/scholarship, prelims, etc.

The presentations should cover the proposed topic and identify its relationship to exclusionary spaces; highlight the literature/theoretical framework/policy environment; lay out a relevant case study or application to Milwaukee/Wisconsin; and identify five questions or areas of debate for further discussion with those attending the roundtable.
