Method in Madness: Application of Mixed Methodology in a Dissertation

Chakraborty's research explores how the Low-Income Housing Tax Credit (LIHTC) is instrumentalized to promote poverty deconcentration, better socioeconomic outcomes and upward mobility for distressed places and communities. Conceived to be instrument of economic growth, an LIHTC developments produced suboptimal outcomes by routinely locating in high-poverty areas, exacerbating poverty concentration. Using longitudinal data for over 300 Metropolitan Areas, this study explores changes that occurred due to effective LIHTC developments at the neighborhood level. This presentation will explore the methodological treatment using a mixed-method approach with a diverse data type in addressing the research questions posed in my dissertation.

Tathagato Chakraborty is a Ph.D. candidate in Urban Studies. His dissertation explores the connection among housing policy design, poverty and inequality, and geographies of opportunities. He is a recipient of the UWM Distinguished Dissertator Fellowship (2020-21) and is currently a Graduate Research Fellow at the Center for Economic Development at UW-Milwaukee.
